## Reflection from Father Tom

### Christ, Our King

The culmination of the liturgical year is solemnized with the Feast of Christ the King. The interesting fact is: while Jesus lived in the world, he neither claimed to be a King of Jews nor he acted like one nor he lived in a palace. But he came to the world to serve and not to be served. In the Gospel today we would read the conversation between Jesus and Pilate: *"Are you the King of the Jews?" Jesus answered, "Do you say this on your own or have others told you about me?" ... "My kingdom does not belong to this world. If my kingdom did belong to this world, my attendants would be fighting to keep me from being handed over to the Jews. But as it is, my kingdom is not here."* So, Pilate said to him, *"Then you are a king?" Jesus answered, "You say I am a king. For this I was born and for this I came into the world, to testify to the truth."* In brief Jesus summarized his life and mission in simple words that he came to this world to testify to the truth of being a servant to others.

Jesus replied to Pilate that 'King' is the word Pilate was using, but his mission is to testify to the truth, and he was the truth. What is that truth? Pilate asked the question but did not wait for the answer. The truth of Jesus is that he be crucified and be resurrected to bring eternal life to all. The truth is that the grain of wheat should die to produce more. Thus, His death on the cross teaches us that the surrender to God's will is the victory of life. He humbled Himself to God's will before being the Master. The truth is that one must serve to be the master.

We are called to take the role of leadership in our various walks of life. How do we claim to be good leaders like our Master? A successful leader is a good follower. And a **faithful follower will be a fruitful leader**. We learn to lead others by faithfully following our Heavenly Master. We exercise our leadership by listening to the needs of the people who are under our care. For, a leader is a protector and provider. So, we are called to care for our families especially our children, the people in our workplaces and friends in our communities.

**Thanksgiving:** The spiritual life of our joyful communities is reinforced by our spirit of gratitude. We grow as a community of love by thanking one another. I feel the lack of gratitude or taking people for granted is a sin against our community, as the ungratefulness of one may kill the spirit of giving on the part of the giver. By being grateful, we in-

vite people to the life of dedication and commitment. Being grateful makes one to be joyful.

Thanking blesses the one who gives and the one who receives. As the recipient is required to thank the donor, the donor should be grateful for the opportunity to share his/her gifts with others; because we are not the 'owner' of what we give. The happiness that comes out of our sharing with others is the greatest of all happiness. It is the foretaste of heavenly bliss. Let us thank God for the 'spirit of giving' in us. Let us have that spirit to the fullest during this season of Thanksgiving. I thank you for your love and support for me as your pastor and the great sacrifices you make for the betterment of our faith community. **To be Joyful, let us be Grateful!** I wish you and your families a very '**Happy Thanksgiving Day!**'

## Advent Reflection Dec 14th

### Advent Afternoon of Reflection

On Saturday, December 14, 2024, from 1:30 pm to 3:30pm, spiritual director David Liedl will be leading an Advent Reflection in Visitation Hall entitled “Rejoice, O Highly Favored: Three Ways to Welcome the Word Made Flesh”. The Advent/Christmas Season celebrates the manifold ways God chooses to live among us, to be for us “Emmanuel.” Our afternoon of reflection explores three ways that enable us to better open ourselves to the Word Made Flesh and deepen our experience of joy, gratitude, and peace. Guiding us to these reflections will be one of Fra Angelico’s masterpieces from the 15<sup>th</sup> century. His painting, The Annunciation, stands at the top of a staircase in the Monastery of San Marco in Florence, Italy. The fresco was intended to inspire the monks of his monastery who walked past this image every day. Come join us as we seek to gather our own treasure of spiritual inspiration from this great work of art and for this great season.

Our reflection leader, David Liedl, was shaped by the spirituality of St. Francis of Assisi having lived for 33 years as a Franciscan brother. In that capacity he served: as a contemplative in the South Bronx, a retreat director in Orlando, and a community leader in Minneapolis. He is a trained spiritual director and provided ministry as a chaplain and Director of Pastoral Care at Catholic Eldercare. The one constant in his varied expressions of ministry is his passion to help people live into the fullness of their spiritual lives. His artistic talents find expression as a musician, poet, photographer, potter, and liturgical artist. He lives in Fridley, has an active practice as a spiritual director, and offers respite care for people living with dementia.
