Reflection from Father Tom

The New Commandment

From the Old Testament we have received the Ten Commandments. In the New Testament, Jesus summarized all the commandments into one commandment of Love which has the two parts: love God and love your neighbors.

The book of Leviticus has a similar commandment that Jesus has given through the gospel today. “Do not seek revenge or bear a grudge against anyone among your people, but love your neighbor as yourself. I am the LORD.” (Lev: 19:18). I give you a new commandment: love one another. As I have loved you, so you also should love one another” (Jn 13:34). Then one may wonder, ‘Why did Jesus say ‘I give you a new commandment: love one another?’ Apparently, it may look like there is nothing new about it, as the book of Leviticus has already mentioned this commandment. However, if we study both passages very closely, we will be able find the newness in the commandment.

The uniqueness of Jesus' words compared to that of Leviticus is that He commands the disciples, ‘Love one another as I have loved you. In the Old Testament God commands, ‘love your neighbor as yourself because I am the Lord who is commanding. Here, we see that the scale of love is up to the one who loves oneself. Whereas in the NT, the scale of love should be that of Jesus' love: ‘love one another as I have loved you.’ The newness of this great commandment is enhanced in the New Testament, by the example said by God who became human, and washed the feet of his disciples with humility, dying on the cross with sacrifice, and forgave his enemies with love. “*I have set you an example that you should do as I have done for you*” (Jn 13:15). The newness of this commandment is that it is consequential to Jesus' example of love for us. In Leviticus, one has to love his neighbor as he loves himself. Whereas Jesus' command is to love others following the example exhibited by Himself.

Jesus gave us this commandment of ‘Love’ two thousand years ago. However, we still struggle to practice it in our daily lives. ‘Love’ is the word we use more often than any other words while we talk to our family members. But, ‘Love’ is also a word we use often without its real meaning.

In this world of consumerism, we tend to love things rather than people. In the ‘culture of pleasure’ we tend to love the things that may give us instant happiness rather than loving people which may have short-time struggles but leads us to eternal reward.

Reflection Continued

Jesus says, “This is how all will know that you are my disciples, if you have love for one another.” So, we need to ask ourselves, “Should I be known as Jesus’ disciple because of my love for my spouse, my children, and members of my extended family?” Can we be known as his disciples because of our love for others? The real love for others demands sacrifice, not satisfaction. It calls us to give more than to receive. It reminds us to focus on self-giving rather than selfishness. Genuine love makes us heroes, but without it, we are mere zeros.

May the God of Love fill our hearts with the greatest love for one another!


